1st Oct to 20th Oct 1917

Monday Beach near Marakeb

No 265068 Corporal Albert William PALMER drowned while bathing about 16.00 hours Oct 1st. Buried in Khan Ifumis Cemetary 2nd Oct 1917.

Officiating Chaplain Reverend father LAFFAN (No of Grave 29)

29 Riding Horses and 12 Pack Horses arrived 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant MALLETT reported from overseas 3<sup>rd</sup> Oct 1917.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant FW DELVES (transferred from East Riding of Yorkshire Yeomanry) arrived from SELONIKA and taken on strength dated 7<sup>th</sup> Oct 1917.

Captain GM FITZ GERALD to Senior Officers Course HELIOPOLIS 13th Oct 1917.

Captain FW CARTER from Selonika (Originally 3<sup>rd</sup> Line of the Regiment) arrived 14<sup>th</sup> Oct 1917.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant WEBER to ZEITOUN for Signalling Course 19<sup>th</sup> Oct 1917.

Sergeants JONES EB and EDWARDS EV left for commissioned Royal Flying Corps 20<sup>th</sup> Oct 1917.

Captain FW CARTER appointed Divisional Burial Officer.

Sun 21st Oct

Instructions received to be ready to move forward.

Mon Thu 22<sup>nd</sup> – Wed 24<sup>th</sup> Oct Removing stores etc continued

Thu 25<sup>th</sup> Oct.

Regiment left beach at 10.00 hours and arrived HISEIA bivouac area 17.30.

Marching out state: 23 officers, 430 ordinary ranks, 472 horses, 61 mules, 22 donkeys 14 vehicles.

Fri 26<sup>th</sup> Oct.

Whole 8th Mounted Brigade in bivouac area at HISEIA.

Instructions to proceed this afternoon to front line and hold the line through ELL BOGGAR Road, 720, 630 550 510, 310, 300, 280, front of 15 miles (Reference map BEERSHEBA 1/125,000)

This Regiment to hold line from 630 (exclusive) to 280 inclusive – the left sector. Left HISEIA 13.30, arrived 16.30 and took over line.

'B' Squadron (Captain WATSON) from 550 inclusive to 510 inclusive.

'C' Squadron (Major FURGESON) from 510 exclusive to 280 inclusive.

'A' Squadron (Captain FRANCIS) with Regimental Headquarters in reserve.

#### Sat 27th Oct.

Nothing to report during night but about 04.30 enemy attacked with about 4000 Infantry and two Regiments of Cavalry, battery of guns and two camel guns.

They attacked the sector 720 to 550 inclusive.

2nd Lieutenant Scopes on 550 and Captain WATSON with supports between 550 and 510, both shelled and attacked by machine gun fire. Casualties 5 men wounded, maintained their position

At 7.30 Captain Francis with two troops of 'A' Squadron went to support 630, came under shell fire.

Casualties 4 ordinary ranks wounded, 5 horses.

When he reached Headquarters Middlesex Yeomanry was told he was not required as Infantry had come up.

5<sup>th</sup> Battalion Royal Welsh Fusiliers, 7<sup>th</sup> Battalion Royal Welsh Fusiliers and the Hereford Regiment (all 53<sup>rd</sup> Division) came through Regimental Headquarters on way to 550 and 630.

Heavily shelled by shrapnel. About 12 slight casualties treated by our Medical Officer. Regiment with the rest of Brigade withdrew 19.00 hours as 53<sup>rd</sup> Division had taken up One. '6' Squadron left out to observe on left flank of infantry from point 510 to 280.

#### Sun 28th Oct. 1917

Casualties in regiment yesterday were as follows:- Sergeant PULZER, Corporal PLANT, Lieutenant MANSFIELD, Fusilier Lieutenant's EVE, TYLER, RAYNER, HILL?, OXFORD, Lieutenant GEORGE WA & SS BARTON.

'A' Squadron (Captain FRANCIS) sent out to relieve 'C' Squadron on left of Infantry at 1700. Brigade Casualties yesterday between 70 and 80 of whom 4 Officers killed and 5 or 6 wounded. 'A' Squadron (Captain FRANCIS) relieved 'C' Squadron on left flank.

#### Mon 29th Oct.

Communication from 'General Officer Command' congratulating the Brigade on the gallant fight put up and stating that the Higher Command had thanked the GOC. 'B' Squadron (Captain WATSON) relieved 'A' Squadron on left flank

No 265607 Private Egan BK accidentality shot himself in the leg whilst cleaning his rifle. 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant JD YOUNG to Royal Flying Corps CAIRO for interviews.

Tue 30<sup>th</sup> Oct.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant HG EVEREST to Hotchkiss Course ZEITOUN. Secret communication received that tomorrow being ZERO, the Brigade would be ready to move in half-an-hour's notice.

General idea ANZAC Mounted Division and Australian Mounted Division to make demonstration against the South and East of BEERSHEBA respectively at 0900. On left of Australian Mounted Division the 7<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade link up with 60<sup>th</sup> Division and 74<sup>th</sup> Division (20th Corps) who attack BEERSEBA from the West at 10.00. On the left of the 74<sup>th</sup> are the 53<sup>rd</sup> who protect the left flank. Further to the left are the 21<sup>st</sup> Corps who make a holding attack on GAZA.

In the event of enemy creating a diversion by trying to break through between the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Corps the Yeoman Mounted Division to come into the gap.

[During the third attack on Gaza, which took place on 31<sup>st</sup> October, the regiment was held in readiness but was not ordered into action. It finally began to advance a few days later]

Wed 31<sup>st</sup> Oct.

Standing-to all day. Word received in evening that BEERSEBA had fallen. Strength of Regiment in camp. 22 Officers, 427 other ranks, 440 Riding Horses, 62 Draught Mules & 37 Pack horses, 22 Donkeys, 12 Hotchkiss Rifles. Total men in hospital 47.

Further notes received that BEERSHEBA was captured At 17.30 last night and that the water there is good. Standing by awaiting orders.

Fri 2<sup>nd</sup> Nov.

Communication from Commander-in-Chief and from General Officer Command 20 Corps thanking the Brigade for their services on 27<sup>th</sup> Oct. Also wire from Chief of Imperial General Staff to same effect. News from GAZA how that line advanced and UMBRELLA HILL taken (21<sup>st</sup> Corps) 20<sup>th</sup> Corps occupied IRGEIG and found excellent water supply with new ? and pumping machine, with storage for 10,000 galleons.

Sat 3rd Nov.

Standing by: Dust Storm: Word received at 22.00 hours that Brigade would move tomorrow, starting with this Regiment at 06.15 to position 1 mile North of GOZ-EL-BAZAL.

Sun 4th Nov

Left 06.15. Arrived 08.30. Marching-out state. 23 Officers, 424 Ordinary Ranks, 442 Riding horses, 37 Pack horses, 61 mules, 12 Hotchkiss Guns, 2 two-wheeled and 12 four wheeled vehicles.

Arrived GOZ-EL-BAZAL received orders to move to BEERSHEBA tomorrow.

Mon 5<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Left Camp 08.15 Whole Yeomanry Division marched to BEERSHEBA arrived there 17.00 hours

Tue 6<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Arrived in position on BEERSHEBA-ABU KHUFF track about 2 miles North East of Kh.EL-MUWEILEH 53<sup>rd</sup> Division. Attacked on right and ½? on left.

6<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade linked up three Divisions. Mounted 22<sup>nd</sup> Brigade and 8<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade in support.

About 14.00 hours Brigade moved to Kh.EL-MUWEILEH to fill gap there.

At 17.00 Brigade ordered to move back to position 2 miles south of AIN KOLEH and take up outpost line between 53<sup>rd</sup> Division and 22<sup>nd</sup> Mounted Brigade. Held line all night.

Wed 7<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Held outpost line till 17.00, when ordered to extend left flank to touch 22<sup>nd</sup> Mounted Brigade.

Thu 8<sup>th</sup> Nov.

At 6.30 Brigade left position and moved to take up line between Wadi ABU KHUFF and Wadi KHUWEILEH. Whole Division moved.

Brigade and Regiment shelled whole time crossing hills south of ABU KHUFF.

About 70 shrapnel fired, no casualties in Regiment, arrived in position.

City of London Yeomanry engaged enemy near TEL METADIL several casualties.

'B' Squadron this Regiment covered withdrawal of City of London and acted as rear guard to Brigade which moved at 18.10 to TEL-EL-SHERIA

Fri 9<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Reference Map PALESTINE Sheet 20 1 inch to mile. Arrived at TEL-EL-SHERIA 24.30 Bad watering. Dead Turks and animals in Wadi.

Lieutenant GLEASON to hospital on 8<sup>th</sup> Nov. Left TEL-EL-SHERIA at 07.00 for HUJ. No rations or forage.

From HUJ pushed on to JELAMEH (S160) objective to attack SIMSIM.

Information that SIMSIM evacuated. Evidence that many had retreated hastily as tents, guns, war material and stores had been left behind.

Stayed at JELAMEH overnight.

Sat 10<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Left JELAMEH 05.15 and moved via HUJ to TEL-EL-NEJILEH (H180) Brigade watered there. Information that enemy retreat from coast across to JERUSALEM road and putting up stray flank resistance.

Left NEJILEH 15.00 and arrived at point in neighbourhood of ARAN-EL-ABU-HUSEIN (Z148) where camped for night.

Sun 11th Nov.

Left 04.00. Information that ASKALON had fallen.

Proceeded via TEL-EL-HESY and FALUTEH to EL MEJDEL (East of ASKALON) arriving there at 20.00

Heavy rain, thunder and lightening stormy night.

Mon 12<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Left 08.30, arrived ESDUD 12.00

Left ESDUD 1600 and acted as support Regiment to the Brigade which had taken up line remaining from ESDUD towards BURKA.

BURKA taken during night by 156 Brigade (52 Division)

Tue 13<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Instructions to take YEBNA. Two officers patrols sent out at 05.00. They reported that YEBNA defended. Regiment moved 06.30. Engaged enemy at 08.05. Enemy defended with shell fire, machine gun and rifle.

Hampshire Battalion Royal Horse Artillery supported us about 10.30 enemy seemed to be withdrawing and at 10.45 Regiment galloped into YEBNA. No casualties.

Established ourselves there while the 155 and 157 Infantry Brigades (52 Division) attacked BESHSHIT.

Camped for night west of YEBNA. 'A' Squadron outpost line on south lines. Lieutenant GOWING-SCOPES to hospital.

Wed 14<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Information that 6<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade to attack MUGHAR south east YEBNA. This Regiment in support.

Two officer patrols sent out 05.30 to clear up tactical situation west of YEBNA.

One squad ('C' Major John-FERGUSON) holding line to Sand Dunes to prevent any attack on left being made immobilised. Gave order at 09.00 for 'C' Squad to be called in.

Left with 'A' and 'B' Squads at 09.15 for position one mile west of NAANE. Shelled by enemy at 11.45.

22<sup>nd</sup> Mounted Brigade galloped into NAANE (unoccupied) but were very heavily shelled from three sides.

This Regiment (less 'C' Squad) advanced with 1 Squad City of London Yeomanry from ridge too ridge. Enemy holding ridge north west of NAANE.

Engaged with enemy till 16.30 heavily shelled but maintained position. Casualties, 3 men wounded (Appendix A).

At 16.30 orders received not to advance further. Outpost five? held for night on position confirmed during day.

At 22.00 hours wire received that 6<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> Brigades would attack ABU SHUSHE at 07.00 tomorrow and that 8<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade would engage enemy in his present position.

Thur 15<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Morning patrols reported at 05.30 that many had evacuated position.

6<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> Mounted Brigades attacked ABI SHUSHE at 07.00, severe fighting, heavily shelled. In our hands about 09.00

6<sup>th</sup> Battalion lost heavily. At 10.45 orders received to march on RAMLE at 11.15.

Arrived there 13.00. Inhabitants friendly. Governor stated that Turkish Army had passed through about 10,000 strong and 7?

Camped outside RAMLE for night.

Fri 16<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Left RAMLE 09.15 and proceeded to LUDD.

Shelled on journey. Camped at LUDD

Sat 17<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Left LUDD 08.00 for ANNABEH (PALESTINE Sheet 17) with orders to patrol tract of country and report on roads, water, signs of enemy. Arrived ANNABEH 11.00 'B' Squad to BIFILYA (2 miles east). Patrols sent out at once. Reports received in evening and sent to Brigade Headquarters at RAMLE:- No roads, no water (except in village cisterns) and no signs of enemy.

Sun 18th Nov.

Wire received to march on to BEIT UR EL TAHTA and live on country if supplies fail. Left 09.00 proceeded via EL BURJ.

At 12.00 advanced fronts ran into 20 Turks who laid down their arms.

Troops sent to take over but 250 Australian Cavalry appeared and opened fire, allowing Turkish prisoners to escape.

Regiment attacked on right flank and in front. Bodies of enemy (30 to 40 in a body) seen working about. Enemy continued until 16.00

Further progress impossible so resolved to camp for night where we were.

Hillposts put out surrounding bivouac Captured 5 Turks, no casualties.

Quiet night (Position of camp square J35R PALESTINE Sheet 17)

Mon 19<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Quiet night, morning patrols reported enemy fire during night.

Orders to march to BIREH on JERUSALEM road about 10 miles north of JERUSALEM (Sq U22C PALESTINE Sheet 17)

Left at 12.20 and proceeded with Brigade to TAHTA from which place into WADI SUNT. Narrow Wadi bed. All battalions. Steep rocky hills rising several hundred feet up. Hills signalled by 8<sup>th</sup> City of London Yeomen. Horses had to be led in single file.

At 14.00 held up by enemy fire from hills. 'C' Squad sent up from Wadi dismounted to help. 1<sup>st</sup> Company to dislodge enemy. At 17.00 enemy withdrew. Casualties Lance Corporal WOOD killed. Sergeant DICKINSON wounded.

'C' Squad returned to Wadi 21.00. Camped in Wadi overnight.

Very heavy rain driving night. Miserable cold time.

Tue 20th Nov.

At 6.00 orders to withdraw down Wadi and advance over hills instead. Left 6.30 stayed at TAHTA till 10.30. Had to lead horses in single file over stony mountains.

After passing through BEIT UR EL FOKA proceeded two mile south east and camped for night. Enemy in force in neighbourhood. Put out four troops as higher outposts. 6<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> Brigades in touch with enemy, heavy rain during night, miserable conditions.

Wed 21<sup>st</sup> Nov.

Left bivouac 09.00 6<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> Brigades to continue the attack towards BEITUNIA. 8<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade in reserve.

Held up by enemy when about one mile north east (1g R14d) and halted.

About 11.00 hours enemy guns began to shell very heavily and finally got away.

The Regiments first shelling resulted in three men killed, 9 wounded and 16 horses killed.

6<sup>th</sup> Brigade hard pressed so City of London Yeomanry Regiment thrown forward to keep heavy fighting enemy and bring in numbers.

Said to be two infantry divisions. Heavy fighting all day till sunset.

Held our position. Yeoman Mounted Division suffered severely.

This Regiment allowed rest of Division to pass through and finally withdrew at 03.15 on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Casualties today six men killed (three died of wounds) and one officer Major JOHNSON FERGUSON and nineteen officers wounded (Appendix 'B'). Captain MEADE rejoined from hospital.

Thu 22<sup>nd</sup> Nov.

Marched at 3.15 to BEITUREH EOKA arriving there at 05.15.

Horses sent on in advance at 18.00.

Previous night, horses casualties fighting 31 killed, 13 missing.

Fri 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov.

Numbers actually present in Count for fighting purposes 17 Officers, 248 Ordinary Ranks. Instructions received to be prepared to put all available dismounted men into the field.

Sat 24th Nov.

Dismounted party told off ready to start on half hours notice.

Infantry to attack on right. Dismounted Yeomanry Division to make demonstration on left. Dismounted party left 13.30 – Three officers Captain WATSON and Lieutenants

MATTHEWS and DELVES, 150 ordinary ranks 32 horses.

Orders received that remanent of Regiment and all horses to leave at daybreak tomorrow for RAMLE.

Number of ordinary ranks in hospital – sick and wounded as per Army Book FUZ – 140

Sun 25<sup>th</sup> Nov RAMLEH

Left FOKA 06.00 13 officers, 81 ordinary ranks, 356 horses.

Arrived RAMLE 12.00

Major GRANVILLE left to command Lincoln Yeoman

Mon 26<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Assistant Director Veterinary Services reports that Brigade horses will not be fit for work for two months. Sending them in batches to Mobile Veterinary Section.

Tue 27<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Sent fifteen horses to Mobile Veterinary Section

Enemy aeroplane flew low over our camp about 22.30 repeatedly firing her machine gun.

No Casualties. Sixteen remounts arrived four of them pack horses.

Wed 28<sup>th</sup> Nov. Still at RAMLEH. On 29<sup>th</sup> Lieutenant MALLETT to hospital

Fri 30<sup>th</sup> Nov.

Twenty horses to Mobile Veterinary Section.

On 30<sup>th</sup> Captain FITZGERALD returned from Senior Officers course at HELIOPOLIS for which he left us on 13<sup>th</sup> Oct.

Total strength at this date including seven seven officers, forty four ordinary ranks, and 74 horses retracted is 22 officers 355 ordinary ranks 344 horses.

## Operations of dismounted portion of regiment since 24<sup>th</sup> Nov.

On 24th be? to SHEIKH AMR (Reference Map Palestine Sheet 17 square R20a)

At 11.30 on 25<sup>th</sup> relieved 1<sup>st</sup> County at R21a and R22a.

At 11.30 on 26<sup>th</sup> relieved by 1<sup>st</sup> County returned to SHEIKH AMR.

At 11.30 on 27<sup>th</sup> relieved 1<sup>st</sup> County and stayed on till 29<sup>th</sup>.

Severely attacked all the time.

Enemy forced back the left and occupied FOKA getting connected behind our Regiments Brigades Headquarters south of BEIT ANAN (D 29B) Division Headquarters at TAHTA.

On 27<sup>th</sup> 'A' squadron sent to neighbourhood of at TIREH to assist 1<sup>st</sup> Company and City London Yeomanry who were being hard pressed.

'B' and 'C' squadrons remained and held on to R21A and R21B. On 29th 'C' squad had for ordinary ranks wounded (Appendix C)

On 29<sup>th</sup> the 60<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division arrived on right and 74<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division on left so Regiment relieved and returned to BEIT SIRA on 30<sup>th</sup> Nov to ANNABEH

Sat 1<sup>st</sup> Dec 1917 AKIR

Orders received at 03.00 that horses to be sent to ANNABEH for dismounted party and that Brigade would move to ZERNUKA.

Sent 148 led horses to ANNABEH at 08.30

Left with remainder for ZERNUKA at 09.00

Arrived 11.20 moved from there to AKIR where new camp arranged for dismounted party from the hills arrived 17.30 hours.

Sun Tues 2<sup>nd</sup> Dec.

Wire from General Officer Command 20<sup>th</sup> Corps to Yeoman Division expressing admiration of Corps for the gallant way in which the thin cavalry lines held out in the mountains until supplies enabled infantry to relieve.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant MILTON and 'B' Echelon transport rejoined Regiment after having been detached since 5<sup>th</sup> Nov 17.

Mon 3<sup>rd</sup>-10<sup>th</sup> Dec

Lieutenant KIRBY returned from leave to England for which he sailed on 21<sup>st</sup> Sep. Lieutenant WEBER returned from Signalling Course ZEITOUN

49 ordinary rank reinforcements arrived of which 36 were hospital cases and 13 new men from overseas.

Major E SOPPER (17 $^{\text{th}}$  Royal Lancers) attached City of London Yeomanry appointed 2 $^{\text{nd}}$  in command of Regiment

Fri 7<sup>th</sup> Dec 17. Seven remounts arrived

Mon 10<sup>th</sup> Dec 17

Received instructions that Division would move tomorrow to MEJDEL.

Tue 11th Dec.

Left camp 08.30 arrived ESDUD 13.00 bivouaced for night Marching out state 22 officers, 310 ordinary ranks, 308 horses, 53 mules Dismounted party walked – 44 ordinary ranks.

Wed 12<sup>th</sup> Dec ESDUD

Left ESDUD 09.00 arrived in vicinity of MEJDEL 12.30.

New Camp situated beside ASKALON half mile from sea.

No 265349 Lance Corporal H ATKINSON and No 265565 Private A PARKER (both 'C' Squad awarded MILITARY MEDAL for behaviour while in charge of Hotchkiss Guns on 27<sup>th</sup> November with dismounted party in hills 13<sup>th</sup> Dec.

Lieutenant and Quartermaster BOURNE to hospital.

Near to ASKALON

Draft of 55 ordinary ranks arrived 18th Dec.

29 Riding and 7 draught horses arrived.

Programme of training arranged for during stay in reserve.

Hotchkiss Gun, bombing, musketry, instructional classes, riding school etc.

Wed 19th Dec.

The Commander-in-Chief (General ALLENBY) presented ribbons to officers and other ranks of the Division who had been awarded decorations.

Parade of Division. Marched past at walk and trot.

Sat 22<sup>nd</sup> Dec.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant MELLETT rejoined from hospital

Mon 24th Dec.

Terrible storm of wind and rain.

Tue 25<sup>th</sup> Dec.

News received that Private CRITCHELL CA wounded on 21<sup>st</sup> Nov 17 had died of wounds in CAIRO on 20<sup>th</sup> Dec 17, and been buried in Cemetery, OLD CAIRO (Sec 075) 28<sup>th</sup> Dec. Divisional Commander (General BARROW) inspected reinforcements and remounts.

Fri 28th Dec.

News received that Private ANSELL ('C' Squadron) had died of wounds received on 21<sup>st</sup> Nov in Citadel Hospital Cairo on 21<sup>st</sup> Dec, buried in Cemetery OLD CAIRO. Major SOPPER returned from leave.

Sun 30th Dec.

Lieutenant WARNER proceeded on leave to Egypt.

Mon 31<sup>st</sup> Dec.

Wire received that Division would be required to move SOUTH on 2<sup>nd</sup> January. Lieutenant SHEDDEN returned from leave in England.

Tues 1st Jan 1918 ASKALON

Began transporting stores etc to rail for move southward.

Sent off dismounted party of general infantry ordinary ranks to proceed by rail with stores.

Wed 2<sup>nd</sup> Jan.

Left ASKALON 07.30

Desert Mounted Corps (Less one Division) withdrawing to BELAH.

Marching out state of Regiment. 22 officers, 319 ordinary ranks, 354 horses, 54 mules, 12 donkeys, 14 vehicles.

In addition 91 dismounted men who left 1<sup>st</sup> Infantry arrived GAZA 12.30 and bivouaced for night.

Six ordinary ranks left for commissions in Royal Flying Corps.

Thu 3<sup>rd</sup> Jan.

Left GAZA 08.00. Arrived BELAH 12.00.

Lieutenant HR FARNELL-WATSON rejoined from leave in Egypt.

Nothing to report. Weather bad. Storms of wind and rain. Roads impassable. Captain GM FINDLAY rejoined Regiment.

Orders received from 29<sup>th</sup> Infantry. Brigade to move tomorrow and occupy BEIT RIMA (C41) and high ground in vicinity.

75<sup>th</sup> Division on left to patrol to GHUSSANEH (A27 Central)

29<sup>th</sup> Brigade to occupy KEFR TUT (A3660) on re-adjunctment of line.

Tue 19th Mar. BEIT RIMA

'B' Squad (Captain CARTER) left camp at 07.30 as advanced guard and occupied BEIT RIMA and high ground 10.35.

No opposition. Rest of Regiment followed in small bodies.

At 13.15 Enemy commenced shelling from north east. Searching position lasted till 14.15 About forty shells both high explosive and shrapnel. Two horses wounded. No other casualties.

Stopped transport camels and remainder of Regiment from entering position till dusk. Got into touch with 75<sup>th</sup> Division at SH KAUWASH and 5<sup>th</sup> Connaught Rangers at KEFR TUT.

Put out four posts and four Machine Guns for night.

Wen 20<sup>th</sup> Mar.

Enemy shelled position at 07.55 till 08.15. Eight shells. No Casualties.

Serg JJ JOHNSON and Serg ROBERTS to Officers Cadet course at ZEITOUN.

58<sup>th</sup> Rifles and 75<sup>th</sup> Division occupied GUSSANEH during night and 6<sup>th</sup> Lancashire occupied KEFR TUT

Viewed both during morning and fixed patrols to meet at night.

One patrol to GHUSSANEH and second to KEFR TUT.

Posts fixed as follows at BEIT RIMA

2) A346.95

3) A29a. 04

Enemy commenced shelling again at 16.30

At 21.15 firing and bombing on left.

Sent out patrol. Met 58<sup>th</sup> Rifles who reported small raid by enemy on their position at GHUSSANEH. Quiet night.

Patrols met 58th Rifles and 6th Lancashire's on left and right respectively during night

Thu 21st Mar. BEIT RIMA

11.45 Position shelled by enemy. Eight shells high explosive and shrapnel.

No Casualties

13.15 Lieutenant KIRBY and six men reconnoitred Wadi east of BEIT RIMA from A35d to A29 a 93 came under accurate sniper fire.

Casualties nil.

Orders received from Intelligence Agent at BEIT ELLO to arrest the Mughdar of BEIT RIMA.

As two men appeared to answer to that title arrested both namely HASSAN-ES-SENNA and YUSEF and sent them under escort to BEIT ELLO at 14.00 Inhabitants of BEIT RIMA at present number about 450.

Fri 22<sup>nd</sup> Mar.

09.00 Dispatched Sergeant and five mounted orderlies to act as standard bearers for Duke of CONNAUGHT from BEIT AMMAR to DEIR NIDHAM today.

Also sent seven men to police the camel track. Quiet day.

Sat 23<sup>rd</sup> Mar.

Nothing to report during night. Considerable shelling by enemy artillery of positions in the right and left between 7.40 and 14.25

Present distribution of Regiment is as follows:

Towards evening heavy storm of wind and rain with thunder and lightening broke out.

Mon 25th Mar.

Nothing to report during night.

Rain continued in steady downpour during night and morning.

Miserable conditions.

Slight movement of enemy observed round mosques of KEFR AIN.

Wet night men soaked.

Tue 26th Mar.

Nothing to report during night.

Fine morning but heavy showers during day present Machine Gun men approved drying? Movement observed in and about mosques of KEFR AIN throughout the daybreak 10.20 slight movement observed about KARAWA-IBN-ZEID (A14d)

14.40 enemy commenced shelling KEFR TUT from north west.

Wed 27th Mar.

Nothing to report during night. Rain ceased., fine morning, quiet day.

About 09.40 heavy firing and guns. Machine guns and rifles – broke out in the vicinity of SH KAUWASH (A20a81) and (A27a87) and continued with violence till 20.45. Intermittent firing during night.

Learned from patrol sent by our support troops to GHUSSANEH that firing caused by ? of 58<sup>th</sup> Rifles towards EL KEFR (A8C50)

Thu 28<sup>th</sup> Mar.

Nothing to report in our front during night. Fine day.

No clothing? in camp, sent Regiment? home only a few septic sores? Quiet day. At 17.00 enemy fire some shrapnel landing track between NEBI SELAH and BEIT RIMA by which our camels transport stores?

Fri 29<sup>th</sup> Mar. BEIT RIMA - Map Reference PALESTINE 8. 14 1" to mile

Quiet night. Instructions received to evacuate all the inhabitants and their flocks and herds. Arranged to commence evacuation tomorrow night. Quiet day. Rained heavily in evening. About 19.30 enemy shelled GHUSSANEH.

Heavy rain during night. At 03.00 right sub-sector of 233<sup>rd</sup> Brigade (75<sup>th</sup> Division) advanced to include EL KEFR and SH NAFUKH.

Orders received from 10<sup>th</sup> Division at 14.00 that Regiment to be prepared to move at short notice to rejoin Yeoman Division.

Wire from 29<sup>th</sup> Brigade at 22.00 that we are to move tomorrow night and that all inhabitants of BEIT RIMA [Bayt Rima] must be evacuated before we leave.

Sun 31<sup>st</sup> Mar.

Quiet night. At 03.00 commenced to evacuate inhabitants of BEIT RIMA. Evacuation completed 04.15. Sent under escort to POEIT ELLO.

No 265212 SS BARNETT reported slightly wounded by shrapnel last night while in Wadi with camels.

6<sup>th</sup> LEINSTER (Infantry platoon) with machine guns to take over from us tonight. Marching out state:

17 Officers, 274 ordinary ranks, 318 horses, 46 mules, 4 donkeys, 12 vehicles.

Machine Gun Squadron, 3 Officers, 75 ordinary ranks, 120 Horses, 5 Donkeys.

Wire received that 'A' Squad will join us at LATRON on 2<sup>nd</sup> Apr.

Left BEIT RIMA 18.30 and LEINSTER'S relieving us.

Wet and very dark night. Difficult journey through the passes.

Arrived BEIT ELLO 22.00 no casualties.

Camped for night. Baggage camels arrived 02.00 1st Apr.

Tue 2<sup>nd</sup> Apr.

Left HARITH 08.00 for LATRON arriving there 12.00. Good march.

Generals BATES and BUTLER inspected our horses and informed us that we were to hand in our horses at BELAH, turned into a Machine Gun Company and proceed to FRANCE.

Wen 3<sup>rd</sup> Apr.

Left LATRON 07.00 and proceeded to high ground near JULIS arriving there 15.40. Watered at JUNCTION STATION on the way and halted for one hour to feed. Message received from 8<sup>th</sup> Mounted Brigade that Adjutant and Quartermaster to push onto BELAH as rapidly as possible to see to reorganisation.

Thu 5<sup>th</sup> Apr.

Adjutant and Quartermaster proceeded to BELAH arriving there 14.00.

Regiment left JULIS 07.30 and headed GAZA 14.30 where it camped for night.

Fri 5<sup>th</sup> Apr.

Left GAZA 07.15 reached BELAH 10.00.

Orders that this Regiment and City of London Yeoman to form one Machine Gun Battalion and Regiment supplying two Companies.

Sat 6<sup>th</sup> Apr.

Handed in to Remounts 438 horses. Also handed in stores and saddlery.

Colonel SALT to command Battalion.

The Commander in Chief visited officers and said 'Good bye'.

Sun 7<sup>th</sup> Apr BELAH

Handing in stores to Ordinance.

General ROME bade farewell to Regiment.

Mon 8<sup>th</sup> Apr.

Handed in remaining animals to Remounts.

Left BELAH Station by train at 20.10.

Marching out state 23 Officers, 410 ordinary ranks.

Tue 9<sup>th</sup> Apr.

Arrived KANTARA 06.30. Joined by Captain MAINWARING, Captain FRANCIS, Lieutenant MT SMITH, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant CROUCH, Lieutenant POULTER and 87 ordinary ranks as reinforcements and also by several detached men.

Wen 10<sup>th</sup> Apr.

Left KANTARA by train at 01.30. Marching out state 30 Officers, 532 ordinary ranks. Arrived ALEXANDRIA (SIDI BISHR) 06.45.

Thu 11<sup>th</sup> to Tue 30<sup>th</sup> Apr SIDI BISHR

Organisation of Battalion proceeded with:

This Regiment's two Companies commanded by Major JOHNSON-FERGUSON (no 3), Captain FRANCIS (no 4)

Programme of training arranged and carried out consisting of musketry, semaphore [flag signalling], manual bayonet, infantry drill, route marches.

24<sup>th</sup> Apr 1918 Instructions in Hotchkiss Gun started for all Officers and Sergeants Lieutenant and Quartermaster BOURNE left to report to Headquarters 75<sup>th</sup> Division. Strength of Regiment: 29 officers, 527 ordinary ranks.
