There were apparently more Wanseys before these buried in this vault in the Minster Churchyard, for a record refers to "these last 22 buried in Our Grave." An old record says that when on Jan 13, 1816, William Hubbard Wansey was interred (aged 7 months and nine days) at the West end of the grave, all the old coffins appeared quite sound.

Gifts to Churches by the Wauncies

1080

Hugo de Waunci, Patron of the Church of West Barsham gives it to the Priory of Castleacre Ditto as Patron of Depeden.

Sir Hugh also gave the Church of Thruxton to Castleacre Priory (Dug. Mon. I. 622)

Hugh, his grandson is patron and had the advowson of Thruxton Church. He confirmed certain lands at West Barsham in pure alms as Esmond his Aunt bad before done.

William son of Hugh confirmed the gifts of his father and further gave them 4 acres with liberty of the fold course for 180 sheep and also confirmed to them the mill called Bridge Mill with the customs belonging thereto.

Sir Roger de W. gave Stansted Church to Merton Abbey in Surrey also Hunsdon Church temp. H.I. (Stansted and Hunsdon were near Roydon.)

Michael de W. half the Manor of Stansted, Herts.

1353

Walter Wansey gave lands to Cambridge University at Poundisbury which is in the hundred of Casleford (Carleford?) in Suffolk - a rectory valued in the King's Book 17.11.3. in the gift of Trinity College, Cambridge. It is 3 ¼ miles NW. of Wodebridge with Chdad (Church) to St. Mary. Worth now over £700 a. year.

"When Walter Wancy, Clerk, gave this land to the Master and scholars of Michalhouse there was no College at Cambridge and only one other Hall (Peterhouse founded in 1257 and just endowed in 1282). Michalhouse was founded in 1324 by Harey de Stanton who was Chancellor of the Exchequer to Edward II, so that Walter Wancy's Benefaction was within 30 years of its foundation, and he being styled "Clericus" might probably have had his education there."

"It seems not improbable that this early family of Wauney may have migrated from the neighbourhood of Salisbury along the Vale of Wylye and eventually settled in Warminster (20 miles distant). We often find the younger sons of good families embarking in the clothing business in its earlier and more prosperous days" (McKite's Letter, Devizes Museum).

Adhelmersten was called Clyve Wancy after Radulfus (Ralph) de Wancy who held lands there C. 1275. (Test de Nevill 137)

Clyve Wancy now Clevancy is in the Parish of Hilmarton on the road from Calne to Wooton Bassett in N. Wilts, 3 miles N.E. from Calne. It took its name from our family. The land is. 8 carucates. It paid gold (tax) for 9 hides.

Geoffrey de Wauncy held lands in Oxfordshire, Wiltshire and other places in the reign of Edward I. (1272 - 1307).

His name which is misprinted Wauncl in Archaeologie Vol XXXIX occurs as Gefrai de Waunci in St. George's Roll of Arms - with the old coat of GULES, THREE GAUNTS, ARGENT, and the same coat of arms is given for "lon (John) de Waunci in the very ancient roll of the Society of Antiqueries, No. 17.


Two branches of our family were in Wilts in the reign of Henry III. In the Testa de Navil it is recorded that Ralph de Waunci in 1221 holds at Helmerton a military fee of Roger de Bluet also one military fee at Wodhall (near Cricklade) of the Earl Marshall and the King.

Geoffry de Wancy holds in Clive Wancy ½ military fee of the Earl Marshall (E .Clare) and he of the King, together with one fee at Lewarton in Berks under the Abbey of Abingdon (temp. H. 3 or Ed. 1.)

William Wansey in 1779 says:-

"About 40 names are entered in the Warminster Church Register before any Wansey, but none of those 40 are any names of people that now reside in Warminster (at least of any note) so that our Family are upon Record, as inhabitants of this town, prior to any other Family now residing here."



All these have lived sometime in Warminster during a period of 400 years.
